get along = llevarse bien con alguien.

- It's late. I really should get back now.

es tarde. Debería volver ahora mismo.

get back = volver.

- I've just got back into running after two years.

he vuelto a correr después de dos años.

get back into = volver a hacer algo después de un tiempo sin hacerlo.

- he took it from my pocket. Get after him!

me lo ha sacado del bolsillo. ¡Vete tras él!

get after = perseguir.

- get out of here! leave me alone!

¡Vete de aquí! ¡Déjame en paz!

get out = salir, irse, escapar.

- I was able to get over my fears once I faced them.

Fui capaz de superar mis miedos cuando les hice frente.

get over = superar.

- no matter how hard you try, you're not getting round me.

por mucho que lo intentes, no me vas a convencer.

get round = convencer.
