

• Pasado simple: Son acciones o estados que comenzaron y finalizaron en un tiempo determinado de tiempo.

Pasado continuo: Se utiliza para declarar acciones que se desarrollan en el pasado.

Pasado perfecto simple: Se utiliza para expresar secuencias de eventos en el pasado y para identificar que ocurrió primero.

Pasado perfecto continuo: Este tiempo es útil para definir una acción continua en el pasado que sucedió anterior a otra.

Condicional perfecto: Sirve para expresar acciones que pudieran haber ocurrido, pero no sucedieron por alguna razón.

Condicional perfecto continuo: Al igual que el condicional perfecto, expresa situaciones que hubieran ocurrido, pero tienen un tiempo de duración mayor.

Presente simple: Se utiliza este tiempo para hablar de acciones que suceden con frecuencia, ya sean diarias o con periodicidad específica.

Presente continuo: Son acciones o estados que suceden continuamente o que se realicen justo en el momento en que se habla.

Presente perfecto: Son acciones que comenzaron en algún momento del pasado y que continúan hasta el momento en que se habla.

Presente perfecto continuo: Estados que se han desarrollado por un tiempo determinado que empiezan en el pasado y continúan en el momento en que se habla.

Condicional simple: Expresa situaciones hipotéticas en el presente que sucederían de no ser por una situación que lo impide.

Future simple: Con este tiempo se expresan acciones que se piensan de manera espontánea y sucederán en el futuro.

Future simple (going to): Se declaran acciones que seguramente se van a realizar en el futuro.

Future continuo: Son estados que tendrán progreso durante el futuro.

Future perfect: Acciones que serán completadas en algún momento en el futuro.

Futuro perfecto continuo: sirve para expresar acciones que ocurrirán en el futuro, al igual que su conclusión.

Past simple

- I traveled around your country last summer.
- It rained all night.
- I wrote a note for you didn't you see it?
- Where did you buy those chocolate?
- I didn't think about that, sorry.

Past continuous

- They were talking about it on the news.
- I was travelling all day and I arrived a bit late last night.
- I was walking home when I saw her.
- They were waiting for you all the morning.
- I was expecting you to answer.

Past perfect simple

- We had eaten all the cakes when she called.
- We had not eaten all the cookies when she called.
- I hadn't done my homework, so I was in trouble.
- My grandpa had saved the picture before the car accident.
- They had slept just two hours when the baby woke them up.

Past perfect continuous

- I had not been studying English very long.
- I had been watching a horror movie.
- I hadn't been drinking alcohol for a long time.
- My dog hadn't been sleeping well before he died.
- Had the children been acting strange?

Conditional / perfect

- You would have worked.
- It would have been good to study Chinese.
- I would have passed the exam if I had studied.

- She would have eaten more cake if she wasn't on diet.
- Tom ~~would~~ have come today.

Conditional Perfect Continuous

- I would have been living here if I had won the lottery.
- They ~~know~~ he would have been playing football this morning.
- She would have been waiting for me if she had found a good date.
- She would have been studying without my help.
- She would have been driving faster.

Present simple

- We play basketball every Tuesday.
- They never drink coffee.
- He lives in Chicago.
- We usually go to the cinema on Fridays.
- She works in a bank.

Present Continuous

- I am eating.
- She is reading a book.
- She is working at the mall.
- We are learning English together.
- I am thinking about my plans for this weekend.

Present Perfect

- I've lost my keys.
- I have seen what he can do.
- What have you done?
- Have you ever been to Poland?
- Don't worry, I have taken care of it.

Present perfect Continuous

- It's been raining since yesterday.
- I have been watching tv for three hours.
- She has been playing the piano.
- They have been thinking about it for a long time.

- They haven't been attending class.

Conditional simple

- Would you like to stay for tea?
- I would probably be sleepy.
- If it were earlier, I would go to the party.
- We would need a bigger house.
- I would like to go to the premier of the movie.

Future simple

- I will come back tomorrow.
- I won't waste money on this.
- Will it rain?
- Will you be home for dinner?
- I will see you next week.

Future Continuous

- She will be visiting us next Christmas.
- You will be playing cards.

- You won't be playing basketball.

- We shan't be driving fast.

- Won't it be raining when you come back?

Future perfect

- He will have decided to leave.
- You will not have finished your exam by 10 o'clock.
- We shall not have finished our task by this evening.
- Shall we have done the ironing tomorrow?
- When will they have arrested the criminal?

Future perfect continuous

- I'll have been running for over an hour.
- You will not have been watching TV.
- They will have been living together for long.
- She'll not have been using my bike.
- Will she have been travelling to New York?
