

He jumped back into the taxi and told the driver to take him home. The driver drove quickly and Martin arrived back at his house in twenty minutes.





PAST PROGRESSIVE

The past progressive (or past continuous) is used for actions that were happening at a specific time in the past. Like the present continuous, it is formed with the auxiliary verb "to be" and the werb + ing.

To form the past progressive, the auxiliary verb "to be" and the verb + ing are used. The auxiliary verb "to be" is in the past simple, but keep in mind that "to be" is an irregular verb.
