PAST PROGRESSIVE

The past progressive (or past continuous) is used for actions that were happening at a specific time in the past. Like the present continuous, it is formed with the auxiliary verb "to be" and the verb + ing.

To form the past progressive, the auxiliary verb "to be" and the verb + ing are used. The auxiliary verb "to be" is in the past simple, but keep in mind that "to be" is an irregular verb.
